Doing the Lord's Work

1 Cor. 16:10

Introduction:

- A. There is no work more important than the Lord's Work
 - 1. Paul and Timothy did it. (Text)
 - 2. All Christians must do it (1 Cor. 15:58)
- B. Jesus tells us the kind of work he came to do. (Lk. 19:10; Matt. 20:28-nkjv)
 - 1. We must continue his work on earth.
 - 2. He describes three important phases of his work.

Discussion:

I. Seeking the Lost.

- A. Involves understanding who is lost.
 - 1. All immoral people (1 Cor. 6:9-10; Gal. 5:19-21).
 - 2. Some good, honest, and God-fearing people.
 - a. Saul (Acts 26:5, 9-11; 23:1; 1 Tim. 1:12-15)
 - b. Cornelius (Acts 10:1-2; 11:14).
 - 3. Anyone without Christ (Eph. 2:12).
 - 4. Unfaithful and backsliding servants. (Matt. 25:26, 30; Jas. 5:19-20).
- B. Involves genuine concern for the lost. (Lk. 15:6, 9, 24, 32)

II. Saving the Lost.

- A. Involves understanding that we can save souls.
 - 1. Not in primary sense only Christ saves.
 - 2. But in secondary sense. (1 Tim. 4:16).
- B. Involves using God's word to save souls. (Cf. Jas. 1:21).
 - 1. Word convinces one that he is lost.
 - 2. Word convinces one how to be saved.
- C. Involves ordering life to save souls.
 - 1. By exemplary living (1 Tim. 4:12-16).
 - 2. By unselfish living. (1 Cor. 9:19-23).

III. Serving Rather than Being Served.

- A. Great paradox of Life: Better served by serving.
 - 1. More blessed to give than receive. (Acts 20:35).
 - 2. Find life by losing it. (Matt. 16:25).
 - 3. Greater to serve than be served. (Lk. 22:24-27).
- B. May become so wrapped up my needs, my happiness, my welfare that I lose it all.
- C. JFK's right idea: "Ask not what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country?"
 - 1. Christian can apply it to his family
 - 2. Christian may apply it to his community.
 - 3. Christian can apply it to the church.

Conclusion:

- A. Are we abounding in the Lord's work of Seeking? Saving? Serving?
- B. Are we so concerned with what's in it for us that we lose sight of spirit and work of Christ?
