The Ten Lepers

Luke 17:11-19

Introduction:

- A. Little boy given a cookie. Mother asks, "What are you supposed say?" Answer: "May I have two?"
- B. The story of the ten lepers begins with mercy and ends with ingratitude.
- C. The story of the ten lepers can be told in four parts each with part teaching a valuable lesson: Discussion:

I. The *Predicament* of the Ten.

- A. A dreaded disease leprosy.
 - 1. Placed in isolation. (Lev. 13:46 cf. 2 Chr. 26:20-21).
 - 2. Had to be verified as clean by priests before re-entering society. (Lev. 14:1-9).
- B. A worse disease sin.
 - 1. Universal. (Rom. 3:10,21)
 - 2. Separates us from God, His people and hope. (Eph. 2:1,12; Rev. 21:27).
 - 3. Have to be verified as clean by Great High Priest. (Rev. 1:5,6)

II. The Plea of the Ten.

- A. A plea for mercy (v. 13)
 - 1. Could not heal themselves.
 - 2. No man could heal them.
- B. Another plea for mercy. (Lk. 18:13).
- C. Still another plea for mercy. (Lk. 16:24)

III. The Purification of the Ten.

- A. Features of their purification from leprosy.
 - 1. It was divine by the Son of God.
 - 2. It was by grace or mercy. (v. 13)
 - 3. It was by faith. (v. 19).
 - 4. It was conditional. (v. 14).
- B. Features of our purification from sin.
 - 1. It is divine (Acts 4:12)
 - 2. It is by grace or mercy. (Tit. 3:2-7)
 - 3. It is by faith. (John 8:24; Eph 2:8,9).
 - 4. It is conditional. (Mk. 16:16; Acts 2:38; 10:34,35).

IV. The *Postscript* of the Story.

- A. Only one of ten returned to glorify God and give thanks (vv. 15-18).
- B. How often is this scenario repeated? What ingratitude!
 - 1. Such may be lack of thoughtfulness.
 - 2. Such may be a sign of depravity. (cf. Rom. 1:21).
- C. How often do we fail to thank those who have favored us?
 - 1. The Lord?
 - 2. A brother or sister?
 - 3. A neighbor?
 - 4. A stranger?
- D. How often do we expect or demand more rather than being praising and thanking?
- E. How often do we "bite the hand that feeds us?" (cf. 2 Cor. 12:15).
